Award will double with matching grant

(Millsboro) (April 15, 2014) — As part of its ongoing mission to serve the community, The Long Neck Sunrise Rotary Club presented a \$1,000 donation to Kevin Gilmore, Executive Director, Sussex County Habitat for Humanity, to assist in the organization's home repair and home building programs. Funds for the donation were part of the \$9,000 proceeds raised at Long Neck Sunrise Rotary Club's popular golf tournament to aid local and other Rotary charities. This year's tournament will be held on Thursday, June 12, 2014 at The Peninsula Golf Course. The Long Neck Sunrise Rotary Club meets weekly at 7:30 am on Tuesdays for breakfast at the Ocean Grill II on Long Neck Road. Visitors and prospective members are always welcome.



The Sussex County Habitat for Humanity organization is responsible for building or renovating eight to ten homes each year sold to deserving individuals or families. In addition to the home building program for which Habitat is best known, the Sussex County group also offers a home repair program. Originally known as "Brush with Kindness," the program has evolved from performing 18 minor home repairs to doing more major home repair projects such as roof repair and replacement of HVAC systems.
